This is an opportunity to update you on recent initiatives and future events and I'm happy to report that the membership is very healthy and we continue to receive nominations of clubbable, interesting candidates.

The membership committee has approved a new reciprocal club, the Real Club Nautico de Barcelona. We plan to race there and I am also optimistic that it will make a welcome and congenial mooring for our Mediterranean cruising yachts as they make their way East and West.

Members will be pleased to note that as of this November the membership committee has the same number of lady and gentlemen members. I look forward to the day when we have our first lady RCs and VC.

Nick Bonham gave an excellent talk about the state of the World Marine Art market with senior Bonhams directors as RTYC guests. As I am discovering, there is a long shopping list of responsibilities involved in making the services rendered to members appear effortless and well oiled and a great deal to learn!

Slightly more than half way through our financial year, our financial position overall is satisfactory. We continue to manage costs carefully and to improve the use of the Clubhouse. Coffee Room usage has held up, if not slightly increased. We have introduced a number of specific "themed" weeks. I have good memories of chocolate week! Keep an eye out for them on the website and on the weekly emails and try them out. I believe that the food has maintained a high standard. I am going to put in a word for our wine list at this point. Writing as someone who is known to like his food and wine, I have to say the wine list is both excellent and extremely good value. Many of our fine wines would grace many a Michelin starred establishment's list but I am prepared to bet that all of them would be materially more expensive, probably by a multiple of the price! Look at the price of the Chablis Grand Cru on our list (it's of the order of one third or less of the prices I mention now) - a quick review of the wine lists of three 2 Michelin starred restaurants in London suggest that comparable bottles are between £160 - £280. What more need I say? Take advantage of the expertise of our Sommelier, Mariyana, and enjoy some fine wines over the festive break almost silly prices.

What better to do on a Sunday when the variously named storms rolling across the UK make winter sailing more of a survival event than fun!

Over the August period we were very busy with refurbishing two cabins and the Ladies' Cloakroom. We have a rolling programme of works year by year and the improvements this year have been very well received. Cabin usage is up this year and is making a good contribution to the health of the Club's finances.

Tony Hanna has previously commented that the number of functions and events at the Club had reduced. That trend has continued. We are looking closely at what needs to be done to get numbers up again. In the current economic climate I fear this will be hard work. Club and Clubhouse exist to provide amongst other things, excellent service to members. There is always room and opportunity to do better, to innovate and to consolidate the things we do well. I was also pleased to present a new trophy, awarded to members of a Royal Thames team who have achieved outstanding success overseas, to our victorious New York Yacht Club Invitational Cup team led by William Edwards. It was also fantastic to see Stuart Quarrie receive a standing ovation when he was awarded the Docker Cup for outstanding services to sailing.

This summer the Royal Thames, alongside the Royal London YC, was responsible for the first four days of racing during Cowes Week. Jenny Woods, supported by Malcolm McKeag, and reporting to Peter Taylor of RLYC, ably led a team of over 30 Race Officials on the RYS platform, as well as coordinating the various committee vessels and other support vessels spread out across the Solent. Cowes Week is a monumental operation involving huge amounts of planning, organisation and co-ordination from a vast number of staff and volunteers. I would like to thank all of those involved with Cowes Week 2015 for their hard work. Also my congratulations go to the many members who did so well in their various classes in Cowes Week. It is a sign of the great strength of the Club that so many of our members excelled in this classic event.

Our Race Officials also ran the Gertrude Cup (International Etchells Invitational Regatta) in August and a number of our members entered. Congratulations to our youth team who came 11th overall and first Youth Team.

Although the RYS Bicentenary Regatta seems a long time ago it was a very well run event and my congratulations go to our young Academy team who came second in the very competitive Team Racing competition. This was only eclipsed by the Royal Thames team who secured a hard won victory for the first time at the New York Yacht Club Invitational Cup in September. 17 teams from all over the world competed in this biennial event which is regarded as the peak of one design fleet racing. It is entirely Corinthian and only bona fide members of the yacht club they represent may sail in it.

Much of the Club's own autumn calendar has unfortunately been either cancelled or postponed due to the lack of water in Queen Mary Reservoir, which has made it impossible to launch our J/80s, the Club's RIBS or the Committee Boat. As a result members were unable to participate in Bart's Bash and various other projected Club weekends had to be cancelled. However, we did manage to run the trial event for the UK National Sailing League, run in conjunction with the RYA, later on by craning in the boats.

On the Solent the Sailing Office ran the Autumn Excuse that was as well attended as ever, with fair winds and generally good weather for all the activities followed by a very enjoyable dinner at the Royal Solent YC.

Plans for the future include obtaining a better understanding of what sailing activities our members want to do and what they might want to do with the Club. Our database of members' sailing interests is inadequate and is currently being updated. However, there is still much work to do and we do need you all to engage, albeit briefly, to enable us to update our record of your interests.

Armed with this information we can build on the Club's many sailing opportunities that are the envy of many other clubs. We will continue to grow the Royal Thames' influence on the international sailing scene and together with the various sailing committees instigate new initiatives that will continue to make the Royal Thames the vibrant yacht club it is today.

We now look forward to next year's sailing programme with the Carmela Cup in January and the Cumberland Cup in early May. Later in the year is our Croatia cruise which is already looking very well supported by members, and in October we will be sending a team to the final match of the fifth series of the British American Cup in Oyster Bay.

The last several months have certainly seen a lot of racing activity involving Royal Thames members both as part of RTYC teams or competing individually. Additionally, our fleets of J/70s at Cowes and J/80s at Queen Mary Reservoir have been in steady use throughout most of the summer and autumn months.

Let me kick-off this short update by pointing to arguably our finest team success of 2015. I am, of course, referring to our winning of the New York YC Invitational Cup. This was a fantastic win and more details of this incredible feat are provided elsewhere in this newsletter. Let me simply take this opportunity to congratulate the whole team, which was ably led by William Edwards and John Greenland. Magnificent!

In July, the Royal Yacht Squadron celebrated its bicentenary. As befits this venerable institution, the event featured some top quality racing. We entered teams in two events in the RYS Bicentenary International Regatta, one in the Beneteau F40 fleet racing and an RTYC Academy team in the J/70 team racing event aimed at younger sailors. We finished seventh out of ten clubs competing in the F40s. In the team racing, our Academicians were narrowly beaten into second place overall behind St Francis YC after a weeklong series involving three round robins, a semi final and a final that started with strong wind conditions and finished in light, fluky winds. This was very fine performance involving a talented group of our younger racers led by Academy captain, Honor Fell.

The following month, we sent a team to Newport, RI to compete for the Morgan Cup, widely regarded as the premier keelboat team-racing event in the USA. The Royal Thames was the only overseas yacht club invited to compete alongside nine teams from all corners of the States. The event saw near perfect conditions with all three days sailed in temperatures averaging 28°c and 8-15 knots of wind. The event consisted of a double round robin over two days followed by a knockout on the final day. Under the captaincy of Andy Cornah, the three-boat RTYC team helmed by Andy, Jon Pinner and Sam Littlejohn progressed smoothly through to the knockout stages before losing 2-3 to the Newport Harbour YC team from California in a semi-final. The Thames team then went into a third place play-off with Seawanhaka Corinthian YC. After some truly epic and incredibly close team racing, RTYC emerged with a 3-2 victory to take third place overall behind New York YC 1 and Newport Harbour YC. A very satisfactory performance, which bodes well for next year's BA Cup.

We also sent a team to compete in the biennial Cornerstone Cup, this year hosted by St Francis YC, with the racing taking place in San Francisco Harbour in front of the club and the Golden Gate Bridge. The Cornerstone Cup involves threeboat team racing in J/22s with each team required to have an average age of 40 years plus with at least one of each gender in each boat. Our three boats were helmed by Katie Greenland, Ed Males and Henry Arnold. After a slow start to the event, the RTYC team hit form and won all of its races on the final day. Sadly, this proved a little late. St Francis YC won the event for a second time, followed by New York YC, RTYC third and the Royal Yacht Squadron in fourth place.

A Royal Thames team visited Long Island, NY in October to compete for the Lee Trophy, another one of the most prestigious keelboat racing events in the USA, hosted by the Seawanhaka Corinthian YC. Three-boat team racing in Sonars, the RTYC boats were helmed by John Greenland, Katie Greenland and Andy Cornah. In truth, our racing did not go as planned with the Thames team finishing seventh out of eight, recording five wins and 12 losses. Not a good day at the office!

There have also been numerous impressive individual racing achievements in recent months by RTYC members – too many (I'm pleased!) to mention them all.

#### Cowes Week 2015 included many successes:

- Sir Malcolm Green's Swallow ARCHON gained two firsts throughout the week, placing him in first position for the Swallows.
- Current J/70 European Corinthian Champion, Charlie Esse, finished second in the J/70 mini series. On board was his father Anthony. They clocked up two wins. John Greenland alongside Katie Greenland, Annie Lush (fresh back from her VOR adventures) and Nick Hornby, racing as Rule 1 in an RTYC J/70, came third overall in the J/70 mini series.
- Jack Davies, in his J/70 JUGADOR finished second in the Under 25s Trophy and second in the overall J/70 full week event, as well as third in the Young Skipper's Trophy.
- Ali Hall came third in the J/80 fleet in his boat BOYSTEROUS, gaining firsts in Sunday and Friday's races.
- In the Etchells fleet, RTYC's J/70 bosun, Josh Downer, finished second overall, with a mixed set of results, including one first place and Nick Stagg came third.
- The notoriously competitive Quarter Ton fleet trophy was taken by Sam Laidlaw in AGUILA, who racked up three firsts during the week.
- Peter Bainbridge's Rustler 33 WHISPER finished second overall in Cruiser Division B, taking a bullet in Thursday's race.
- David Franks and his JPK1010 STRAIT DEALER, won IRC Class 4 and finished fourth in the Black Group overall, with three wins through the week.
- Peter Morton's JND 35 SALVO finished first overall in IRC Class 3, with four firsts and third overall in the Black Group.
- Adam Gosling's Corby 36 YES! won IRC Class 2 and finished first overall in the Black Group, with a very impressive array of results, coming first in every race of the week. On board were a number of RTYC members.
- Sir Keith Mills with son Alex came second overall in IRC class 0 on his Ker 40+ INVICTUS.

Winds of up to 12 knots offered ideal conditions for the exciting finals in the Nacra 17 European Championship in late September / early October. RTYC members Ben Saxton, world champion in this class in 2013, and his crew Nicola Groves, took the European gold in Barcelona after finishing fifth in the Medal Race.

*Olympic silver medallists and RTYC members Hannah Mills and Saskia Clark claimed silver for Great Britain at the 470 World Championships in October, at Haifa, Israel.* 

At the J/70 UK National Championships, hosted this year by the Royal Southern YC, Russell Peters took third place overall while Charlie Esse was fourth. Ben Field crewed in the winning boat, BOATS.COM, and was part of the same crew that finished fourth in the J/70 World Championship held a month earlier in July at La Rochelle, France.

Finally, a mention for the Esses, racing BABY J, who finished a creditable fifth in the Corinthian event of the J/70 European Championships at Monaco in October, recording a first and a second across the six races.

As you can see, our racers have not been sitting around 'waiting for the wind', they've been out on the water, competing keenly and, I've no doubt, showing the true Corinthian spirit worthy of a yacht club that celebrated its own bicentenary 40 years ago!

## Race Management

It is with some trepidation that I step into Jenny Woods' shoes as Chair of the Race Officials Committee. With her impressive executive skills and talent for organisation, Jenny has ensured that RTYC continues to provide race management of the highest standard, so I have big shoes to fill! Happily she remains a valuable member of the Race Official pool and continues to represent RTYC on the Cowes Week Sailing Committee.

During the summer, the expertise of the Race Management team was concentrated on a number of events in the Solent. We ran three enjoyable weekend regattas in the annual Cowes Keelboat Series, and the team spirit demonstrated by the ROs in the race box and on the committee boat was further cemented by three very sociable Saturday evening dinners in local restaurants.

July and August saw a repeat of the success of the two major Etchells events which were a new addition to last year's sailing calendar. Constantly changing wind speed and direction during the Saida Cup provided two days of tricky but exciting sailing conditions, which were as testing for the Race Official as they were for the sailors. Three weeks later, 16 international teams from all corners of the globe competed for the Gertrude Cup in the Etchells Invitational Regatta. Strong gusty winds, combined with spring tides, presented some interesting challenges for the Race Management team and the committee boat and mark laying RIBs were kept fully occupied in constantly reconfiguring the course, to deliver four days of exciting, high quality racing, that was so closely contested that the event culminated in a three way tie for first place.

Once again, RTYC ROs had plenty of opportunity to develop their skills during Cowes Week, running the first four days of racing from the Platform of the Royal Yacht Squadron, and providing additional support with a team of drivers for Thames V over the entire week. Light airs meant that our course setters and ROs were kept on their toes to keep the programme of racing on schedule. The Autumn programme of racing at Queen Mary Sailing Club has been sadly hampered by the lack of water in the reservoir which made it impossible to use the lifts to launch the J/80s, the committee boat or the Club's RIBs. Undeterred the Royal Thames set about business as usual and simply found a rather spectacular way to resolve the problem.

Once the boats were finally in the water we were able to resume our sailing programme with the UK Sailing League trial event organised in conjunction with the RYA. The format of short fast fleet races over windward/leeward courses is proving popular on the European circuit and RTYC is looking to spearhead a similar UK Sailing League. Our autumn and winter schedule continued with the Belvidere Cup (match racing for independent schools alumni) and of course, the Carmela Cup and rounds 1 and 2 of the Mum's Bucket coming up in January and February.

We are looking forward to a busy calendar of racing in 2016 with plenty of major events to provide interesting and challenging opportunities for Race Management. The Cumberland Cup, which takes place early in May, continues to grow in scope and popularity and this year we hope to have 10 teams from around the world competing in the event. These include a projected three day regatta for the Solent based Fast 40 class and a revived 1851 Cup providing match racing in Swan 60s.

You don't need to have any experience and, if you want to be more involved, we aim to provide informal and formal training so that you can do as much or as little as you want. Well, back to the main activity of the evening, following an excellent meal with some subtle Brazilian ingredients, with breaks for Raffle ticket selling and the famous "Heads and Tails" game. ## RTYC Charitable Trust

#### Dear Members

As our Vice Commodore kindly noted during his recent Laying Up speech our charity has sponsored, through grants and bursaries, a total of 71 youngsters this year to take part in sea going adventures. These have ranged from activity weeks afloat with organisations such as UKSA, Trinity Sailing Trust and Compass Sailing Trust, through offshore passage making with Rona Sailing Trust and Ocean Youth Trust, to deep sea overseas trips with Jubilee Sailing Trust and the Sea Cadets. Feedback and reports from the youngsters indicate our beneficiaries are thrilled to be given this opportunity and very appreciative of the support from the Royal Thames Charitable Trust.

With ages between 12 and 22 beneficiaries this year have come from across Britain. Many through other charities such as Girvan Youth Trust, Sherbourn Learning Centre and Ahoy Centre, and others direct from local councils schools and families. All suffer from similar problems of a disadvantaged and displaced background through broken and poor families, lack of care and, in some cases serious mistreatment. Some see the only way out is to take to crime and the charity's we work with do their best to ensure they avoid this route whatever their circumstances. We feel our support goes some way in helping them to achieve this.

With record numbers of beneficiaries this year there were still many we were not in a position to support, and with no reason to assume it will be any less next year our thoughts are turning once again to fundraising, and what we might do to replenish our resources.



2015 saw a number of highly successful social events that enabled us to provide the level of support we finally did and included the very popular evening reception aboard "TS TENACIOUS" in Docklands, followed by the equally impressive private dinner aboard "TS LORD NELSON" some weeks later also in Docklands. A bridge evening in Knightsbridge, a quiz night and some early J/70 weekends in Cowes further enhanced our funds but the biggest impact by far was the overwhelming support from members with their generous donations. This has given us the wherewithal and the confidence to plan for what we hope will be another record year. A special thank you to members from the Trustees.

Although we have no firm dates as yet discussions are underway on possible fundraising events for 2016 both at Knightsbridge and elsewhere including perhaps a horse racing evening and a slightly reformatted J/80 event at Queen Mary. It's hoped at least one or two could be included in our already packed 2016 programme.

The steady growth and progress of a charity that could originally only focus on supporting youngsters from south coast regions to one that now operates nationwide is due entirely to the generosity of our members, the support of our Club and the enthusiasm and hard work of my fellow trustees, especially recently retired Andrew Collins who's dedication and attention to detail has ensured we've kept a very high profile over recent years, and to George Ehlers and Mike Halstead. Their organisational and networking skills have produced some popular and rewarding social activities of late. I'd also like to thank our treasurer Rupert Salmon and our secretary Gwynne Lawrence and, last but not least, David Freeman for patiently sitting through our meetings often instilling a sense of reality when needed.

Alternative arrangements will be in place if the Britannia Bar is closed for a function.



#### Entry to the Clubhouse/Late Bar Charges

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Unless you are resident in one of the bedrooms, the Clubhouse opening hours are 7am – 1am. Last entry for non-residents is at 12.30am. There have been incidents of members entering, or attempting to gain entry, outside these hours. The Clubhouse is staffed with one night porter and he has been instructed to strictly apply the opening hours as promulgated in the House Bye-Laws. The Night Porter keeps a small stock of drinks for the use of residents only.

The Cumberland and Britannia barmen work contracted hours. If members require the Cumberland Bar to remain open after the normal closing time of 11pm this may only be allowed if:

- 1. The duty barman agrees to extend his shift,
- 2. The member requesting the extension to the bar opening times accepts responsibility to cover the overtime and late night taxi charge at the rate of £50/hour or part thereof.
- 3. The bar closes no later than 1 am, when all non-residents are required to vacate the premises.

#### Birthday Promotion

Many of you have taken advantage of the 'Birthday Promotion' offering a complimentary Table d'Hôte meal for you and a glass of champagne for you and your guests when lunching or dining in the Coffee Room. The terms of the offer have been updated to provide clarification that this offer is available for those taking a Table d'Hôte lunch or dinner in the Coffee Room Monday – Friday. It is not available on Sunday when taking Brunch which is already significantly discounted. The offer provides for one glass of champagne for each member of a birthday party. Members are reminded of the terms under which RTYC members may access the RCC Library which is the lower of the two RCC rented rooms.

- 1. Access is permitted on days when the rooms are not required for an RCC function or event. We currently hold meetings and dinners each month from October through to May, usually but not exclusively on the first Thursday of each month, and there are other occasions when our members may be holding a private function, in which case we shall give your Secretary reasonable notice of such an event.
- 2. The Library is available for access by your members as a "quiet room" in which they can relax and read the newspaper and suchlike. We ask that they are considerate to other users, and in particular refrain from using mobile telephones when other persons are in the Library, and that they do not hold any social gatherings or meetings without our prior consent.
- 3. Full access to the Library will continue to be enjoyed by RCC members at all times.



#### Website

The Club's website is linked to Jonas, the Club's Integrated Management System, and includes a number of features including improved access to members' information. Members are required to register for the website and then set up their own usernames and password. Separate instructions have been provided to help you do this and we hope you find the site easy to use but do ask if you need help. However, only 25% of the membership has registered to use the new website and, now that on-line booking for events has been implemented, please register to access the benefits that the functionality provides. Once logged in to the members' area, as well as being able to register for events on-line, you will have access to a range of facilities including the members list, your own personal information and access to your real-time Club statements. #### Car Parking At 60 Knightsbridge

This is an ongoing problem for members and we are doing our best to resolve the issues that persist. The terms of the leases and tenancy agreements with the Head Lessee and Sixty Knightsbridge Limited provide for the Club to have permanent use of four car parking spaces in the garage. After 6.30pm until 8.00am members may also avail themselves of spare spaces in the garage that are occupied during the day by vehicles belonging to the Embassy of the State of Kuwait. Between 8.00am and 6.30pm the forecourt and ramp spaces may only be used for a maximum of two hours by both RTYC members and the Embassy staff. Only members who are resident in the Clubhouse or present in the Clubhouse on business may leave vehicles unattended on the premises. Space on the forecourt is at a premium and parked vehicles can cause difficulties for delivery vehicles and taxis. Regrettably some members are still ignoring the rules by parking on the ramp and forecourt for longer than two hours, or parking their vehicles and leaving them unattended whilst away from the premises without informing reception. This causes the Club's staff significant difficulties, particularly when dealing with the Embassy staff that we also have to encourage to obey the provisions of the leases.

#### News from HMS Dragon

Our affiliated warship, the Type 45 destroyer HMS DRAGON, is currently docked down in Portsmouth undergoing a planned upgrade and maintenance. She has a skeleton crew during this refit period and expects to start manning up in the spring with a new Commanding Officer. The ship will then undertake a series of post-refit trials and training before re-joining the operational fleet mid-2016.

The Christmas tree is up and sparkling, Chef Simon Morris and the kitchen brigade have starting roasting the festive fayre which is now available in the Coffee Room until 23rd December - so what about a cracking wine to help you enjoy your seasonal feast. Below our Club sommelier, Mariyana, suggests few bottles of fine wine from the Coffee Room wine list.

#### WHITE WINE SELECTION: 2014 Pouilly-Fumé, Vincent Vatan, Loire Valley, France £22.35

The grapes for this wine come from clay siliceous soils with flint stones which impart the distinctive flintiness to this wine which it is famous for. With its brilliant yellow-gold colour and sharp, visceral nose, this wine is very characteristic of Pouilly-Fumé with a pronounced mineral profile that is very typical of the Loire Valley soils. Ideal with turkey, pork and pasta dishes.

#### 2013 Saint-Aubin, 1er Cru Les Pitangerets, Domaine Paul Pillot, Burgundy, France £43.30

Pitangerets benefits from the slightly warmer south-westerly aspect of the western slopes of the Montrachet. The Pitangerets vines are located in a narrow valley just outside Chassagne-Montrachet.

Pitangerets 1 er Cru is a powerful Burgundian wine, a prime choice of wine to accompany turkey. Fresh but firm, it has a beautiful, complex bouquet that includes touches of vanilla and honey. With an excellent acidity, it is light, has elegant fruit character and a truly excellent finish.



#### 2009 Chardonnay, Hunting Hill, Kumeu River, Auckland, New Zealand £39.60

Michael Brajkovich, the first New Zealander to become a Master of Wine, vastly improved the quality of the fruit though improved drainage systems, the growing of grass between the vine rows and by the introduction of the Lyre trellis system. Its two Chardonnays, the Kumeu River Chardonnay and the Matés Vineyard Chardonnay, are arguably the best in New Zealand and have been consecutively named in the top one hundred wines of the world by the Wine Spectator.

2009 Hunting Hill is a medium- to full-bodied, creamy-textured offering from Hunting Hill. Think streusel-topped citrus, but dry, with a long, harmonious finish.

#### RED WINE SELECTION:

#### 2010 Connétable Talbot, St Julien, Bordeaux, France £44.10

Connétable is the second wine of 4eme Cru Classé Château Talbot, the property named after John Talbot, Earl of Shrewsbury, and commander of the English forces holding Bordeaux in 1453. It is the largest of all Cru Classé estates today with 109 hectares of mainly Cabernet Sauvignon vines planted on gravel and sandy soil supplemented with Merlot. Connétable Talbot was one of the pioneering second wines, created in the 1960s, and has gained in stature with the increasingly stringent selection improvements in vinification. It retains all the typical character of Talbot with classic Médoc elegance and firm structure. The spicy bouquet of cedar, plum and cassis is typical of Saint Julien and leads to exotic spice and black fruits balanced by supple tannins on a lingering finish.

#### 2009 Pommard, Tavannes, Ternand & Laurent Pillot, Burgundy, France £42.40

Since the 19th Century generations of the Pillot family have cultivated the hills of Cote de Beaune. While father Fernand is approaching retirement, his son Laurent cultivates and harvests nearly 14.6 hectares of land spread over 22 different appellations of red & white wines. The father-and-son team focus tirelessly on maintaining quality with their practices: low yields, minimal use of fertilizer and strict hygiene. All of their wines are vinified and matured in a modern winery but Laurent pays special attention to maintain with traditional Burgundian practices.

The Pommard 'Tavannes' is a beautiful 0.8 hectare parcel. The soil is clay limestone, red in colour due to iron oxide. Pommard only produces red wines, therefore, Pinot Noir is The Queen in this village. Pommard 'Tavannes', offering substantial body and round on the palate mouthfeel, with cherry, blackberry and spice aromas. The body expresses fine, slightly dry tannins. Serving suggestions; Turkey, Lamb, strong soft cheeses.

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
